Co-op members share gratitude following Christmas blizzard and power restoration efforts

In some parts of the Slope Electric Cooperative service area, the lights went out on Christmas Day — and so did the linemen.

An epic snow and ice storm started with freezing drizzle, which

froze to the electric distribution and transmission system. It quickly turned to heavy snow, and strong winds created blizzard conditions that made travel dangerous. The North Dakota Department of Transportation

alerted residents to road closures, and a no-travel advisory was issued for nearly the entire state. It remained in effect until noon on Dec. 26, when the snow finally stopped. The U.S. National Weather Service Bismarck,

N.D., reported the Slope Electric Cooperative service area received 12 to 18 inches of snow, with drifts exceeding 18 inches.

Travel was treacherous for the linemen who were dispatched to repair power outages caused by a combination of frost, and in some areas, ice on power lines, snow on cross-arms and blasts of wind. Poor visibility and clogged roads slowed the restoration process, so Slope Electric worked with local road crews to gain access to cleared roads. The safety of the employees and membership is always a priority at your cooperative. Once able to access downed power lines and poles, the linemen proceeded with restoration where possible.

Line crews worked long hours to restore electric service in difficult conditions. Blizzard-related outages affected approximately 100 members, at one time or another, during the storm-restoration process. All power was restored in the Slope Electric service area mid-afternoon on Dec. 28.

Many member-owners took to Facebook to learn the status of power outages and thank the line crews for their efforts. Juanita Aase, a Slope Electric member from the Scranton area, noted, "God's blessings on all your hard work. We don't say thank you enough. May the crews always have God at their side when they go out to work. Happy New Year!"

The weather conditions, clogged roads and the widespread locations of the power outages lengthened the restoration process, and Slope Electric would like to thank our member-owners for the patience, understanding and support shown — especially to your local Touchstone Energy® Cooperative linemen and cooperative staff, who worked with integrity and accountability on Christmas day and during the holidays, so our members and their families could celebrate with comfort and cheer. ■

KEEP A SAFE DISTANCE FROM DAMAGED POWER LINES AND POLES

If you see a downed power line or pole, don't assume it is de-energized. Numerous downed power lines were found to be energized lying in the snow and ice. Stay away from electrical infrastructure and call Slope Electric Cooperative at 800-559-4191 or 701-579-4191 with a location and description of the damage.

CONNECT GENERATORS SAFELY TO AVOID A DANGEROUS CONDITION

Standby electric generators can provide you with an extra sense of security in our unpredictable weather and occasional power outage. We ask that for the safety of you and others, the generator be installed and used safely. Improperly connecting a generator or installing without the proper double-throw or transfer switch can produce a "back-feed" condition. This can feed current back out onto power lines, creating an ELECTRICAL DANGER to you, lineworkers and others. Please contact an authorized generator dealer and or an electrician for standby generator questions and installations to ensure everyone's safety.

Nominating/Resolutions Committee

Slope Electric Cooperative's 72nd annual meeting will be held June 1 at the Enchanted Castle in Regent. Director's terms that expire in 2017 are:

Three board members will be elected to serve three-year terms. The bylaws of Slope Electric Cooperative, Inc. state in Article IV, Section 4, directors can be nominated one of three ways:

1. Through the Nominating Committee. The committee's first meeting is Feb. 21 to review procedures, responsibilities and qualifications for directorship. The second meeting will be held March 15 to nominate candidates for the ballot and to approve resolutions.
2. Members can also be nominated by filing a petition with 15 signatures. Filing must be done 30 days prior to the annual meeting on June 1 and posted at the office of Slope Electric.
3. Members can also be nominated from the floor at the annual meeting. This method means your name will not be preprinted on the ballot, but it can be written in by your supporters.

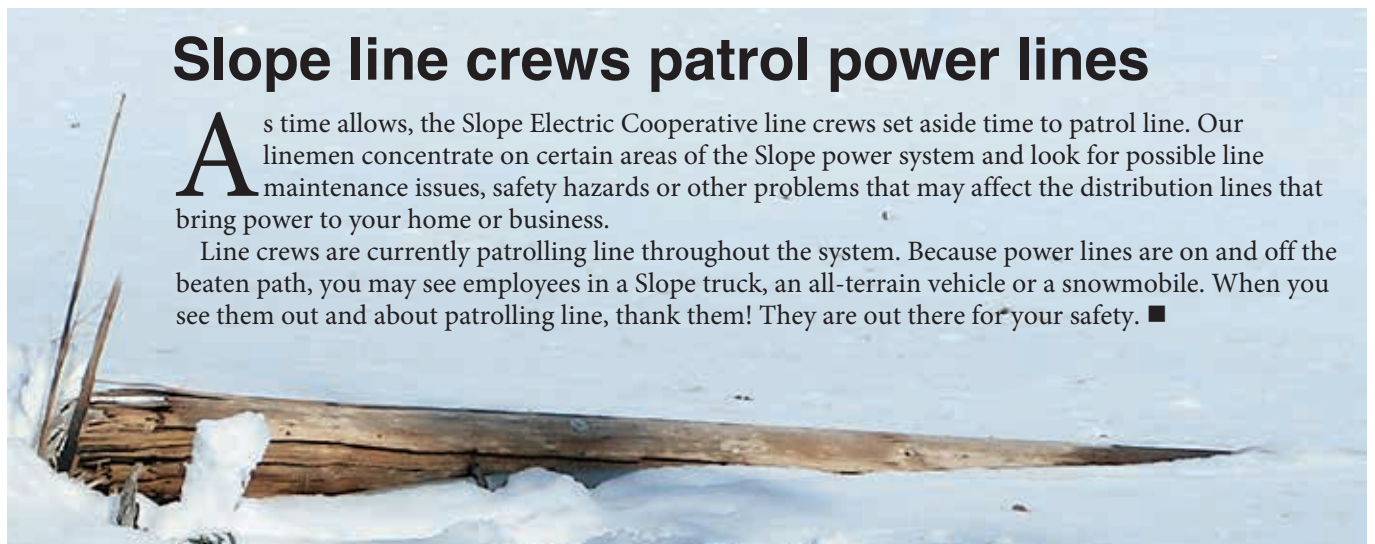

Slope Electric earns Safety Award

The North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives (NDAREC) hosted the 53rd annual REC Apprenticeship Training and Safety (AT&S) Conference Jan. 11-13 at the Ramkota Hotel in Bismarck. The conference is sponsored by the NDAREC AT&S program, with cooperation from the U.S. Department of Labor, Office of Apprenticeship.

The conference drew about 200 representatives of NDAREC member-cooperatives, students of the Bismarck State College lineworker program and the electric industry for classroom sessions, equipment evaluations and awards

ceremonies. Training topics included incident investigation, working in severe weather, temporary protecting grounding and bonding, preparing for dog encounters and more.

Christina Roemmich, director of safety services for NDAREC, says the AT&S conference provides an opportunity to reflect what is going on in the industry, and to recognize the accomplishments the students have made in training and safety throughout the year.

Slope Electric Cooperative employees who attended this year's conference included Operations Manager Dean Volk; and Line Technicians Jeff Boynton, Dusty

Hoff, Logan Seifert and Andrew Sonsalla, and Apprentice Technician Mark Frank.

At the conference awards banquet, Slope Electric was one of six distribution cooperatives in North Dakota to be presented with a Safety Award. These cooperatives were recognized for having zero OSHA-recordable injuries for one year, between the dates of Dec. 1, 2015, to Nov. 30, 2016. This was the third year in a row Slope Electric has received the award. ■

Operation Round Up helps lighten the load

“Illness is a burden — but your actions have lightened the load.”

This statement reflects the gratitude of one recent Operation Round Up grant recipient, who wanted to thank Slope Electric Cooperative members for supporting a charitable program that helps local people and communities in need. In this instance, the grant was used to pay some medical expenses — and ultimately help a patient focus on healing and not on paying for treatment.

Operation Round Up is a program in which Slope Electric members voluntarily choose to round up their monthly utility bills and donate their pennies to a Charitable Trust. The money accumulates, and an elected board reviews applications and awards grants based on need.

Many of the applications Slope Electric receives have a similar request — assistance is needed to pay bills associated with medical expenses.

Lynn Klein, executive assistant at Slope Electric, says the Operation Round Up board of directors prioritizes and awards grants starting with specific needs first. Organizations that do not have other financial resources available to them are also considered a priority.

“The board wants the funds available to do as much direct good as possible,” she shares.

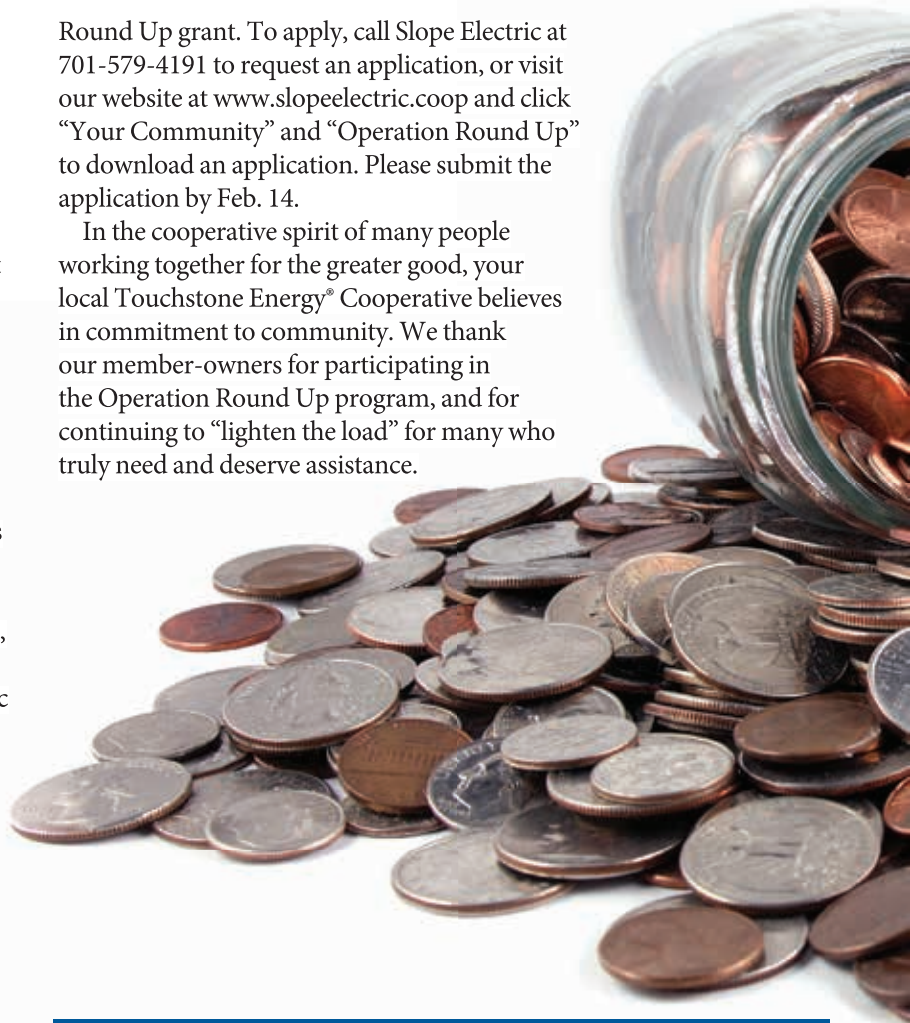
More than 70 percent of Slope Electric’s member-owners participate in this cooperative-based program that generates a little more than \$600 monthly. The cooperative matches the amount, coordinates the meetings and awards the monies.

The five Slope Electric members who serve on the Operation Round Up board include Denise Lorge, John Lee Njos, Harvey Oase, Kim Paulson and Patricia Thomas. They met on Nov. 7 to review applications, and awarded 10 grants. A total of \$8,100 was given to seven individuals, one community and two schools.

The next meeting is scheduled for Feb. 21. Any person living in Adams, Bowman, Hettinger and Slope counties may apply to receive an Operation
