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ELECTRIFYING THE FUTURE: Slope Electric powers into 2024 and beyond

Slope Electric Cooperative is continuously looking for ways to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the infrastructure and communications to best serve you, our members. The team at Slope Electric has been planning 2024 projects well in advance and crews will now be making updates and completing projects. This will ensure Slope Electric can deliver efficient and reliable power to our members.

Along with infrastructure upgrades, the Slope Electric staff is working to meet members around the service area through local events.

Ensuring reliable power

The operations department has been working with the Innovative Energy Alliance (IEA) Cooperative to update substation equipment to become more compatible with the latest technology, notes Chief of Staff/Operations Manager Dean Volk. IEA is a professional service cooperative owned by four electric distribution cooperatives in North Dakota, including Slope Electric.

Volk explains Slope Electric plans to continue the general maintenance of infrastructure, which consists of pole testing and changes, as well as overhead conductor replacement and tree trimming. Throughout the year, crews will also be converting overhead lines to underground.

"One of our greatest challenges right now is getting equipment and materials when we need them," Volk says.

As the year progresses, Slope Electric anticipates some growth in its system and is ready to handle any expansion smoothly. The cooperative also plans to implement new technologies to improve the system and workflow. This includes sectionalizing technologies to reduce outages and the use of a drone to help crews with substation and transmission inspection.

"We're excited to utilize this technology within our service area, propelling us forward in delivering reliable power to our valued members," Volk says.

Connecting with members

The member services department is planning various ways to connect with members throughout the service territory this year. So far this year, Slope Electric has held member appreciation events in Amidon and Regent. These new events brought members and Slope Electric board directors, CEOs and staff together for an opportunity to visit about various topics and answer questions.

"We thank everyone who attended our member appreciation events and cannot wait to see members again at our upcoming annual meeting," Manager of Member Relations Brooke Waltner says.

The next opportunity for members is the Slope Electric annual meeting June 6 in New England. Members can also expect to see sponsored events, including popcorn at high school sporting events and a drawing for Cooperative Month in October, Waltner says. Slope Electric Cooperative

Supporting the service area

Slope Electric also offers a handful of grant and scholarship opportunities throughout the year. Some of these programs include Operation Round Up, which is a voluntary contribution through rounding up electric bills to the next dollar. Funds will be disbursed in the general service area of Slope Electric solely for medical, educational, charitable, safety and scientific purposes by a designated Operation Round Up board. Members can apply for grant funds and find out more about Operation Round Up at www.slopeelectric. coop. The next deadline for applications is May 22.

Slope Electric also believes in supporting youth and provides opportunities for scholarships. Slope Electric provides a handful of scholarships to area high school students at the beginning of the new year. In addition, members can expect more luck-of-the-draw scholarships during this year's annual meeting. Members and their dependents are eligible for three \$1,000 scholarships for full-time students and two \$500 scholarships for part-time students.

SAFETY STARTS WITH ME: Surge protection 101

Behind the walls of your home is a network of wires that ensures the seamless journey of electricity from the power line to your outlet. Sometimes, the unexpected occurs, and an increase in voltage can happen. These are known as power surges.

"Power surges can be caused by lightning, electrical overload, faulty wiring, power outages or other reasons," says Mark Frank, a line technician.

Regardless of the cause, power surges can majorly damage electronic devices and equipment in your home.

"Members can take precautions to prevent the impact surges can have on their electronics," Frank says.

Lightning

Lightning is one of the most common causes of power surges. Most of us have experienced this during a severe thunderstorm. When lightning strikes an electrical system, the excess current must be channeled somewhere. Unfortunately, it's sometimes sent through a home. Your best bet is to unplug all unused devices and electronics during severe thunderstorms.

Electronic overload

Electronic overload is another common cause of power surges. This happens when devices or appliances are plugged into an outlet that can't handle the required amount of voltage or if multiple devices are plugged into one outlet through an extension cord. If you're experiencing power surges due to electrical overload, it's time to call a qualified electrician to evaluate your home's circuits and electrical needs.

Power outages

Surges can also occur after a power outage. Sometimes, when electricity is being restored and reconnected, it's common to experience a quick surge in current. It's best to unplug sensitive electronics during an outage. Then, wait to plug them back in after power is fully restored.

How to prepare for surges

Although Slope Electric Cooperative does its best to provide members with steady, reliable energy, surges can occur.

"Aside from unplugging devices when you suspect a power surge, there are two ways members can take



additional precautions to protect electronics in their homes," Frank says.

Devices like power strips can protect electronics during most surges.

"Not all power strips include surge protection, so it is important to read the packaging label carefully before you buy, and don't overload the power strip with too many devices," Frank says. You can also install specialized electrical outlets that offer additional surge protection.

"Another option is a whole-home surge protector, which can help protect your home from larger, more powerful surges," Frank suggests. In most cases, wholehome suppressors are connected to your home's service panel and include features like thermal fuses and notification capabilities that indicate when a device has been impacted by a surge.

Safety Starts with ME (& YOU)!

Safety is the highest priority at Slope Electric not only for employees, but also for members in their homes.

"We hope these tips help familiarize members with what is in their home and make changes if needed to their power outlets," Frank says. "While occasional power surges are inevitable, simply unplugging devices when you think a surge may occur and using additional levels of protection will ensure a safeguard to your electronics and devices. Remember to check if your home has surge-protecting devices, such as power strips or whole-home suppressors, to create a safety barrier when surges occur."
